Harbor Report Update Package – Changes for the 2020 Season –

An ever-increasing number of GLCC members are viewing the Harbor Reports online or downloading and printing the reports as they need them. The demand for annual paper Harbor Report update packages has been steadily declining to the point that only 14 copies of the 2019 package were ordered. With this in mind, the traditional paper-based Harbor Report Update package will be replaced by collections (by lake/area) posted to the website that can be ordered online or downloaded/printed by members.

These new collections will consist of those Harbor Reports which have had significant changes over the prior year. A "significant change" would include items such as new reports, sketches providing depth or other navigational detail to aid in entry to a particular anchorage or harbor, addition of new marinas or removal of those that have closed, marina maps, along with other details that enhance the boating experience.

Other reports will continue to be updated based on input from members and Port Captains but may not be included if the updates are of less significance. As of October 31st, 275 reports have had updates – those updates vary from correcting broken links to complete re-writes.

The 34th Annual Lake Superior Mid-Winter Dinner will be held in Duluth (S-187) on January 11, 2020. The highlight of the evening is a presentation about the Rock of Ages Lighthouse by David and Heather Gerth. They are director and assistant director of the Rock of Ages Lighthouse Preservation Society. Heather and David are leading the work of restoration with care, energy, and great skill. Last year, our Great Lakes Foundation awarded a \$10,000 grant to the Rock of Ages Lighthouse Preservation Society: https://rockofageslps.org

Rock of Ages (47°52'00"N, 89°18'48"W) is located 4 miles outside of Washington Harbor in the open waters of Lake Superior. The nearest harbor is Windigo Ranger Station, which is at the southern end of Isle Royale National Park. The lighthouse is located in waters that belong to the park. It was first lit 110 years ago in 1910, and automated in 1978.

After dinner, we will hear about the progress of the restoration, and the exciting future of this engineering marvel that still guides and protects all of us approaching Isle Royale. We want to celebrate with you the collaboration between the GLCC, the Rock of Ages Lighthouse Preservation Society, and the National Park Service at Isle Royale. Treat yourself to this special evening. Guests are welcome. We look forward to seeing you there!



Wilderness Rally Turned Into A Wildly Fun Event

Question: Is it still a wilderness when 34 boats are gathered together for a few days of fun and festivities? I know towns with smaller populations than the attendance of the most recent GLCC North Channel Wilderness Rally!

Late in 2018, we started planning a Women Who Sail the Great Lakes (WWSGL) rendezvous to the North Channel of Lake Huron. When I asked about the GLCC Wilderness Rally dates and location, I learned that a chair was needed to organize the 2019 Wilderness Rally! Dan and I were asked if we wanted to organize it. We agreed to do so if the WWSGL Rendezvous could participate. With approval from the GLCC, a plan for a joint GLCC/WWSGL event was launched.

After much research, we selected Turnbull Island (NC-55) at the west end the North Channel as the Rally site. It offered plenty of anchoring room, a beach, and rumors of a picnic table. Perfect!

HIGH WATER

As the boating season started, Dan and I saw reports that record-high water levels (4.5 feet above

the norm) had reduced the beach at Turnbull Island to 60 square feet. We were assured that there would be plenty of beach for our meals and activities.

The official arrival day was Saturday, July 27. Dan and I arrived Thursday afternoon to see 15 Rally boats already anchored out!

By Sunday, 30 boats were secured in the North Anchorage and another 4 in the South Anchorage. The population of our floating town totaled 74 people - including 15 women who were either members of WWSGL or both groups.

GIVING BACK

Previous Women Who Sail Rendezvous included giving to a local charity such as a humane society or school. Honorary Member Roy Eaton suggested Rainbow Rescue, a local animal rescue service run by Bleu Fisher. Taking in abandoned animals of all types and capturing feral cats and getting them spayed/neutered is all part of the mission of Rainbow Rescue. With the request for kitten items, the participants from both GLCC and WWSGL arrived

with cans of kitten food, cat beds, and toys.

ITALIAN SAUSAGE FEAST

A highlight of every Wilderness Rally has been the onshore Hot Dog dinner. We changed it up by offering a couple varieties of Italian sausages topped with sautéed onions and bell peppers. To ensure the best quality dogs, we contacted Pino's in Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. Getting 30+ pounds of sausages, 12 dozen freshly baked buns and numerous boxes of onions, bell peppers and condiments to Turnbull Island from the Soo 90 miles away was the challenge.

Roland Aubé—GLCC Rear Commodore for the North Channel—drove to the Soo to fetch the provisions. On arrival in the anchorage, the onions and bell peppers were dispersed to various boats to be cleaned, sliced and sautéed.

By late afternoon, grill masters were firing up their portable gas grills ashore, dinghies were lining the beach and the feast was on. A memorable meal enjoyed by all.

BYO-COFFEE

Mornings started with a gathering on the beach for conversation and BYO-Coffee. While the chatter was underway, another group found a spot for morning yoga. Between stretches, they occasionally found a blueberry or two as treats.

PRESENTATIONS

 Missy Suidara discussed boat security and selfdefense;

• Port Captain Stephanie Carrico gave lessons on how to do felting;

• Vice Commodore Chuck Mead presented a 25-year membership burgee to Clare and Bill Walker of *MV Rangatira*.

RAINY DAY AT THE WILDERNESS RALLY

Predicted rain on Monday required some juggling of the schedule, but it held off long enough for members of Women Who Sail the Great Lakes to gather on the beach and share stories of life on the water from the female perspective. Unfortunately, the rain forced cancellation of WWSGL member Captain Sarah Cavanagh's presentation on sailing in the America's Cup.

GAMES AND PRIZES

Games have also been a Wilderness Rally tradition and this year was no exception. Included were Dinghy Bingo, Mad Libs and the Amazing Scavenger Hunt.

DINGHY BINGO

For Dinghy Bingo, sailors raft up in their dinghies for a game of North Channel Bingo where popular anchorages and destinations replaced numbers. The raft-up was rained out, but we Bingo continued anyway -- over the VHF. The straight Bingo winner, Corinne from *SV Cormorant II*, won a subscription to *Good Old Boat* magazine.

FLOATING HAPPY HOUR PLUS

The rain stopped in time for the Floating Happy Hour that evening. Boat crews were disbursed among













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several "host boats," with each crew bringing their own beverages and a nosh to share. In addition, the crew of *SV Wind Trail* produced an ice breaker activity with a spin on Mad Libs. Conducted, again, over VHF, this creative activity added the "Plus" to the Floating Happy Hour.

The goal of the ice breaker was to re-write the Turnbull Island Harbor Report. Each host boat was given one or two paragraphs of the harbor report with various words blanked out. Without knowing the original content, they were tasked with finding replacement words that were funny, provocative, or ridiculous.

At the designated time, each host boat read their "revised" section of the Turnbull Island harbor report. It was a great ice-breaker enjoyed by all.

THE AMAZING SCAVENGER HUNT

The forecast for Tuesday was for big winds from the West. Westerly is the one direction that poses a potential problem for boats anchored in Turnbull. The winds held off just long enough for the Amazing Scavenger Hunt to finish at noon.

Jigsaw puzzles, a scavenger hunt, signal flag interpretation and a GPS coordination were among the tasks assigned to seven teams. Team Seven was the first to identify and reach the finish location. Each member of the team received a beautiful Turkish towel from Marmara Imports.

BIG WINDS

Predicted winds started increasing as the Amazing Scavenger Hunt wrapped up. By midafternoon, we were seeing 20 knot winds gusting to 28 knots sweeping into the anchorage. Many of us were anchored mid channel in direct line of the gusts: we were all dancing wildly at the ends of our anchor ropes.

Hoping the winds would die down, the scheduled potluck was delayed from 1700 to 1800 hrs. Shortly before 1800 a VHF "conference call" was held and the final decision was "dinner for breakfast!" With that the onshore potluck was rescheduled to 0800 the next morning!

NEW WILDERNESS RALLY TRADITIONS

Several boats departed with first light the next morning but at 0800, dinghies from the remaining boats swarmed ashore, each bearing coffee or tea and a dish to share. Following introductions, a delicious plated meal was served in grand style. It was an honor and a pleasure to have DYC Commodore Allen Pugh and his lovely wife Lady LaVerne join us for the evening.

Commodore Barzyk provided opening remarks that included acknowledgement of those members and friends who passed away this year. A moment of silence followed. A well-deserved standing ovation was given to Yvonne Murray, GLCC Office Manager, for her unrelenting support of the GLCC even while dealing with her own personal tragedy this past year.

Bill Rohde introduced Captain Jeffery Novak, District 9, Sector Commander for Coast Guard Sector Detroit as the guest speaker. Captain Novak assumed Sector Detroit duty in June 2017. Sector Detroit supports eleven subordinate units with an assigned area of responsibility stretching from Vermilion, Ohio, west and northward beyond Tawas, Michigan along 427 miles of international border with Canada through Lakes Erie, St. Clair and Huron and along the Detroit and St. Clair Rivers. Captain Novak noted the missions of the Coast Guard as search and rescue, maritime safety and security, environmental protection, maritime law enforcement, aids to navigation and ice breaking. He also noted the close working relationship with the Canadian Coast Guard, the Shiprider program as well as other law enforcement agencies on both sides of the boarder. He also described some of the unique challenges faced by the men and women of Sector Detroit. This included water safety and law enforcement related to unsanctioned float downs and massive rafting parties. He particularly requested the eyes and ears of the GLCC in helping to identify illegal charters. Illegal charters are not licensed operations hence are not likely to have adequate safety equipment or trained personnel who are knowledgeable on safe boating practices. These illegal charters put everyone at risk. Captain Jefferies implored the GLCC members that if they "see something say something" by contacting the US or Canadian Coast Guard. A question and answer period ensued. Captain Jefferies was thanked for his personable and very informative talk. At the conclusion of the evening everyone was invited to attend an Afterglow gathering at the Detroit Marriott's Governors Suite. Sunday morning breakfast and fond farewells signaled the conclusion the 2019 AGM.

Finally, a sincere thank you must go to Director Mark Lifter and Arlene Oakland for hosting this year's 2019 AGM. Their rigorous attention to detail along with the gift bags that included GLCC engraved stemless wine glasses (compliments of Mark and Arlene) were greatly appreciated by all attendees and will be a pleasant memory of a very successful AGM Meeting.

Shedding Some Light...

Featured: Milliken State Park Lighthouse, Detroit, Mich. (D-54)

As the first urban park in Michigan, William G. Milliken State Park and Harbor (formerly named Tri-Centennial State Park and Harbor) provides a 31-acre green oasis in the midst of downtown Detroit, Mich. (D-54). The harbor opened to the public in 2004 and offers several covered picnic areas, shoreline fishing and a 52-slip harbor. The Milliken State Park lighthouse is located on Atwater Street and marks the harbor entrance. The 63-foot light tower is a scaled down replica of the Tawas Point lighthouse (originally built in 1876 and is the sole representative of a true Victorian-era style station built on the Great Lakes). Our readers did not correctly identified this light.
