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2022 Was a Great Year, and 2023 will be Better

As your new Commodore, I'm excited, proud and a bit nervous to be the new leader of such a fine organization.

Pam and I enjoyed a six-week cruise this past summer that included coming up Lake Huron on the Michigan side, attending the Rendezvous, and then cruising the North Channel with other GLCC members. We ended the trip by running down through Killarney, Ont. (GB-52), Tobermory, Ont. (GB-3), Kincardine, Ont. (H-7), Goderich, Ont. (H-6) and Port Huron, Mich. (D-1).

(Sometimes if felt like this summer's cruising was fixing issues with *Bleu Lagoon* in new and fun places ...lol. I even had parts shipped to Mackinaw City).

We look forward, now post-COVID, to hosting more in-person events and meetings.

Speaking of next year, the 2023 Rendezvous will be in Cleveland, Ohio (E-10) at the North Coast Harbor Marina (formerly Rock n' Dock). This marina is at the base of downtown Cleveland and adjacent to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Also near the marina are restaurants, parks, baseball (the MLB Guardians) and much more. Chairpersons for this are Rear Commodore (Ret.) Dave and Bobbe Miller. These two ran a successful Rendezvous in 2014 in Leamington and will bring our membership a terrific event.

The 2023 Rendezvous will be Sunday, July 16 through Thursday, July 20. Lake Erie will host its rally on Father's Day weekend. We also are planning a Wilderness Rally in the State Park at Presque Isle Bay, Erie, Pa. (E-4).

Lake Superior, Lake Michigan, Lake Huron and Lake Ontario boaters should consider a trip to Lake Erie next year. We'll even help you plan a cruise to take in all of what Lake Erie has to offer.

In May, the club will hold the Spring Launch meeting in Niagara Falls, Ont from the 5th thru the 7th. This event was scheduled for 2022, but due to an unexpected spike in COVID, we were forced to cancel. This is a great opportunity to participate in a GLCC meeting while taking in the beauty of Niagara Falls.

For all of us US boaters, Canada has removed all of the COVID border crossing requirements: No proof of vaccines, no testing, no quarantine plan and the elimination of the ArriveCAN app.

Besides me becoming your new Commodore, we have Joe McKeown taking on the Vice Commodore role. Joe is from Ann Arbor and sails out of Duncan Bay, Mich. (H-74.5) near Cheboygan. Filling out the bridge are Niels Jenson, Past Commodore, who will continue as our Treasurer, and Jim Austin, who will remain Secretary. Dan Cline moves over to the President of the Great Lakes Foundation. A big thank-you to Dan for his service as Commodore the past two years.

Big Waters Deserve Respect

I was 12 years old in 1966. I was in a car with some Port Hope, Mich. classmates, on our way to the nearby Harbor Beach library on a stormy Nov. 29 afternoon when we saw a Coast Guard helicopter hovering. We clamored for our teacher to turn toward the lake where it was landing. We had no idea what was happening, but we were kids and the opportunity to see helicopters up close was rare.

Miss McCollum parked 50 yards away as the orange-and-white helicopter landed, an ambulance arrived, and a body whose skin color was cobalt blue was loaded into the ambulance. When the ambulance driver didn't race away but instead lit a cigarette and chatted with the helicopter pilot, we fell silent.

Later we found out that the SS *Daniel J. Morrell*, a 603-foot freighter built in 1906, had broken up off shore in the storm. Twenty-eight of the 29 crewmen perished. My mother, then a nurse at Harbor Beach Community Hospital, said the hospital bought new rectal thermometers after discovering the ones they had didn't go low enough to record the body temperature of Dennis Hale, the sole survivor.

Hurricane Ian, which devastated Florida this fall, brought the *Morrell* to mind.

Those of us living along the Great Lakes don't have

to worry about hurricanes. But the lakes are still big waters. And big waters can turn deadly with little warning.

The Great Lakes Cruising Club is dedicated to its members having fun. Underlying that, though, is the training, classes and resources the club provides to ensure their members' security on the lakes. Check out glcclub.com to find out all that's available to help you get safely from port to port. Please.

The Port Huron Museums, of which I'm board president, has an extensive collection of maritime memorabilia highlighting the joy the Great Lakes can bring. It also has artifacts, including some from the *Daniel J. Morrell*, which remind us we must never take our big waters for granted.

SODUS BAY Find Your Haven in New York State

EDITOR'S NOTE: These reports are accurate as of the time they were written. Things change season to season. Please check ahead with local sites if you're planning a visit.

Sodus Bay, in New York State on the southeastern side of Lake Ontario, is one of the largest deep water bays on the US side of Lake Ontario. The village associated with the bay is Sodus Point, an area that incorporates Sand Point and shoreline areas surrounding the northwest part of the bay. Sodus Point has many marinas. Among them: Katlynn Marine, Sodus Marine, Krenzers Marine and the Sodus Bay Yacht Club that caters to larger sailing and power boats.

• Historic Sodus Point: Sodus Point has a rich history dating back to the War of 1812. From the late 19th to early 20th centuries, it was a recreation destination for Rochester, NY, and a large coal loading port. A large trestle built over the bay delivered coal to waiting ships. Sodus Marine is located over the trestle site, which burned in 1971. The Historic Sodus Point website has information on the early Sodus Point and has walking tours that show historic and architectural houses.

• A special place to visit: The Sodus Bay Lighthouse Museum is on North Ontario Street off Bay Street. There are free concerts in season every Sunday on the lighthouse grounds.

• A few nearby places to eat: Most of the restaurants are found on Sand Point, the area that stretches east into the bay starting with Greig Street. Captain Jack's Goodtime Tavern's dinners are recommended. Other good options: Back Alley Grill, Rubino's, the Franklin House Tavern, Marina Grill Sodus Point. The Bay Street Hotel Restaurant is the place for an upscale dinner. Reservations are necessary.


• I really need some ice cream: Six50, a restaurant with the Inside Scoop ice cream shop. If you are looking for a good ice cream at a reasonable price and an extraordinary amount, stop by. For \$3.75 you can get a small dish of ice cream that is anything but small.

• Where to get a nightcap: Check out Abe's Mai Tai Tiki Bar. This is the place to be for live entertainment and drinks.

• A good place to cool off: If you are interested in swimming in the lake from a sand beach, there is Sodus Point Beach Park on Wickham Blvd.

• **Commune with nature:** The Macyville Woods Nature Preserve offers a one-mile trail, off Seaman Street (past Macy Street) up from the Franklin House Tavern on Sentell Street.

• **Shopping in Sodus Point:** Sodus Bay Outfitters is a general store that has food items as well as clothing, boating and fishing gear. There is no grocery store in Sodus Point. The closest one is in the village of Sodus. If you become friendly with one of the regular marina boaters, you may be able to get a ride to it. Several convenience stores offer essentials.

Consider making Lake Erie a part of your 2023 cruising plans. There's a lot going on that you won't want to miss.

• The 2023 Rendezvous will be in Cleveland on July 16-20 at the North Coast Harbor, formerly known as Rock n' Dock. It's in downtown Cleveland, right next to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. It is chaired by Dave and Bobbe Miller – with them in charge, you know it will be a good time. Plus, you have access to Cleveland's sights and sounds from the restaurant scene, Major League Baseball, museums (Great Lakes Science Center, Art, and more). You can see a theater production at Playhouse Square, party in the Flats, visit the West Side Market for foodies, and so much more.

• The Lake Erie Rally is set for Father's Day weekend, on Middle Bass Island, Ohio (E-18.5) June 16–18. This year's theme is African Jungle Cruise (think Humphrey Bogart and Katherine Hepburn). Dave and Lori run a fantastic rally.

• The Wilderness Rally will be at Erie, Pa. (E-4), in early July. It offers the opportunity to anchor in the State Park, an excellent protected harbor.

Lake Erie ports have a lot to offer. For those looking for nightlife and adventure, look to South Bass Island with the Put-in-Bay, Ohio (E-18) nightlife. Or spend a day at Cedar Point, Ohio (E-16.5).

For more simple times, consider:

• Pelee Island, Ont. (E-33), the southernmost point of Canada. The Scudder Marina is small and rustic. You'll feel pretty removed at this location.

• Learnington, Ont. (E-34), is a world-class beautiful marina with festivals on many weekends.

• Port Stanley, Ont. (E-31), is a picturesque small town on the North Shore of Lake Erie with shops (over 25 boutique stores), restaurants, and local theater.

• Kelleys Island, Ohio (E-17), is near the Bass Islands but with less hustle and bustle. Eat fresh Lake Erie perch at the Village Pump and visit the winery.

• Geneva on the Lake (E-6.5), is an Ohio state park with a well-run marina. Have dinner at the lodge adjacent to the marina and hike the state park trails.

• Mentor, Ohio (E-8), allows you to enjoy the Mentor Lagoons and have dinner overlooking the lake at the Mentor Yacht Club.

If this sounds like a commercial for Lake Erie, it is – at least for 2023. Come join us on Lake Erie this season and have the experience of a lifetime. And earn yourself another notch toward GLCC's Admiral Bayfield Award by cruising Lake Erie.

The weekend kicked off Friday afternoon with an informal open house at the GLCC offices, affording time for chatting with members and the office staff, and providing an opportunity to do a bit of holiday shopping for those who might appreciate GLCC mugs, wine glasses, and apparel as gifts.

The Friday evening Meet and Greet (and eat!) was held at the Great Lakes Maritime Center, overlooking the St. Clair River. This venue and the small-plates buffet format were particularly well-suited to socializing. A shout-out is due to Chef Chris Moore of Chef Chris Catering for the food, especially the bacon jam on crostini. (Did you even know there was such a thing as bacon jam? If you try it, you won't forget it!)

Weekend accommodations and general meeting space were provided by the DoubleTree by Hilton, where attendees found lovely views of the twin spans of the international Blue Water Bridge, and of passing watercraft on the St. Clair River just a few hundred feet away from the hotel. Visitors also woke-up to calls early Sunday morning from the foghorns of the freighters sliding by in the dense fog.

Board meetings of both the GLCC and Great Lakes

Foundation were Saturday morning at the Great Lakes Maritime Center. Optional activities for members not attending these meetings included exploring several Port Huron museums, specifically the *Huron* lightship, and the Fort Gratiot Light Station, or shopping downtown.

A wine-tasting event was held at Andy's Wine Bar, a stone's throw from the Maritime Center at Vantage Point. Host Andy Bakko, a certified sommelier and non-certified but delightfully funny comedian, guided us through eight small pours of wines, progressing from dry white to rosé to full-bodied red to sweet dessert wines. 

Since 1999, Sea Bags has collected more than 700 tons of retired sails away from landfills and has repurposed nearly 16,000 sails in the past two years. North Sails, the world's largest sailmaker with operations in 29 countries, produces sails for racing and cruising. The partnership kicked off internally with a sweep of sail lofts in North America in late 2021 which resulted in 166 sails being collected.

Sailors may donate their old sails at any North Sails loft in North America. Sails accepted in the North Sails x Sea Bags repurposing program includes 3Di composite, Dacron, nylon spinnakers, and intact laminates.

Lieutenant Commander Stephen W. Brickey of the USCG *Hollyhock*, a buoy tender whose home port is Port Huron, spoke of his assignments over the years in the Coast Guard. He called it an eye-opening experience to be assigned to the Great Lakes. He and his crew of 15 are responsible for nearly 150 aids to navigation, primarily in lakes Huron and Erie. Those aids will be removed for the season by the end of the year.

The *Hollyhock*'s other missions include search and rescue, environmental protection, and domestic ice-breaking. The *Hollyhock*, which has been in Port Huron since 2003, will permanently leave for major repairs in early summer 2023, to be replaced by the *Sequoia*.




