Recent Club Events

The Club held its first live and in person Board of Directors meeting in Traverse City, Mich. (M-10) on December 4, 2021. Due to a resurgence of COVID-19, travel between the US and Canada became more restricted, and our Canadian board members, as well as a few US members, attended by Zoom. The main focus of the meeting was the Club's financial reserves. The Club has approximately \$730,000 in reserves, and the board discussed how the reserves should be allocated to cover future major costs, such as web site upgrades for the Club and the *GLCCSchool*, general operating reserves, and similar items. The Executive Committee will be reviewing the results of the discussion and making recommendations to the board at its April meeting.

Dinner was held at the Delamar Traverse City hotel, with attendees resplendent in their holiday finery. Traverse City is the home to US Coast Guard Air Station Traverse City, which provides search and rescue services to Lakes Superior, Michigan, and Huron. Lieutenant Commander Ted Keenan and Lieutenant Junior Grade Matt Keiper gave a riveting presentation on the Coast Guard operations, and had some practical suggestions for boaters being evacuated by helicopter. One tip: keep your boat moving. The helicopter can easily keep up with you and it stabilizes your boat.

In early January, Linda and I attended the 2022 Lake Superior Mid-Winter Dinner Meeting held in Roseville, Minn., near Minneapolis. Following a productive Port Captain meeting, a cocktail hour and buffet dinner were held at the DoubleTree Inn, and Eric Thomas spoke about preparing oneself, one's crew, and one's boat for ocean racing from California to Hawaii. Many thanks to Rear Commodore Jim and Deputy Port Captain Angele Passe, and everyone else who was involved in putting on this excellent event.

The Commodore's Challenge

I was somewhat surprised that I received no entries for last issue's Commodore's Challenge. I thought it was an easy one, adapted from *Portney's Ponderables: Brain Teasers for Navigators*, by Joe Portney, but perhaps the reference to celestial navigation scared people off. This was the challenge:

When the survivors of Magellan's circumnavigation returned to Spain, they thought they arrived on Saturday, September 6, 1522. Much to their surprise, the actual date Sunday, September 7, 1522. On the other hand, Phileas Fogg, in Jules Verne's Around the World in 80 Days, departed England on October 2, 1872, in order to win a substantial bet that he could travel around the world and return to England by December 21, 1872. Many adventures later, he returned to England believing it was December 22, 1872, and that he had lost the bet. Much to his surprise, he was a day off; it was actually December 21, and he won the bet. The challenge is to identify which statement is correct, and explain why using a very basic concept in celestial navigation:

- a. Magellan's crew traveled westward and Fogg traveled eastward; or
- b. Magellan's crew traveled eastward and Fogg traveled westward.

The correct answer is a. Magellan's crew traveled westward and Fogg traveled eastward. The very basic concept in celestial navigation I was looking for is **the Earth rotates from west to east**. This means that every day Fogg traveled east, he got a little boost from the rotation of the earth, and by the time he made it back to England, one day was subtracted from his time. The opposite was true for Magellan. This is why, when crossing the International Date Line, we subtract a day heading east and add a day heading west.

April Launch Gathering 2022 – Niagara Falls, Ontario

Hold the weekend of April 22–24, 2022 for our annual April Launch gathering in beautiful Niagara Falls, Ont. We're hoping this will be a cheerful weekend as we finally shake off the dampening effects of border closures, physical distancing and limits on gathering size we've all experienced for the past year and a half. The gathering will be held at the Niagara Falls Marriott Fallsview Hotel and Spa with spectacular close-up views of the Horseshoe Falls.

We plan to start the weekend on Friday with Happy Hour in the Presidential Suite overlooking the Falls, where members are invited to bring their own refreshment to enjoy. After renewing acquaintances over drinks, we expect groups of four, six, or more will head out to one of the dozens of fine restaurants (or modest bistros) within easy walking distance of the hotel. Some may want to try their luck at the Fallsview Casino.

Saturday morning starts with Board meetings for the GLCC and the GLF. These will be followed by an optional tour of the Niagara-on-the-Lake wineries. If you want to skip the organized tour, there's lots to do in Niagara Falls, including walking the promenade by the falls, driving out to Brock's Monument and the surrounding Queenston Heights area rich with history from the War of 1812. Another option might be exploring the kitschy, but fun Clifton Hill area with its wax museums and haunted houses reminiscent of Niagara Falls of the mid 20th century. But we expect many will want to take advantage of the winery tour. Niagara-on-the-Lake is an attractive, charming town surrounded by rich soil and a microclimate warmed in the winter and cooled in the summer by Lake Ontario; perfect for wine making. There are dozens of wineries between Niagara Falls and Niagara-on-the-Lake. Some are large and well-financed operations with advanced visitor facilities on top of their fine wine. Others are modest family estates bottling only a few hundred cases each year.

Saturday evening will be the Commodore's Banquet at the Marriott. We are working to secure an interesting guest speaker for our feast. And following, our traditional Afterglow will be held in the Presidential Suite for even more socializing and cruise planning for the summer of 2022.

Sunday is departure day and you may want to catch up on some of the things you missed on Saturday. A leisurely drive down the picturesque Niagara Parkway to the Queen's Parade in Niagaraon-the-Lake is recommended.

At the winter Great Lakes Foundation Board meeting, in Traverse City, Mich. this past December, the Board of Directors of the Great Lakes Cruising Club approved four grant applications advanced by the Grants Committee. The first one was an application from the Thousand Islands Association, whose main purpose is to supply and maintain recreational navigation buoys throughout the Thousand Islands of the upper St. Lawrence River (SLR-00.1). Their ambitious goal is to replace all 300 markers over a five-year time frame, and this is currently year two. The Board felt strong that this worthy project was deserving of a second Grant, after approving their initial request last year. Each marker's replacement cost is approximately \$275 CAD, and the grand total for the project is well over \$82,000 CAD. These markers not only help keep local boaters, both Canadian and American out of harm's way, but also help protect the fragile ecosystem of the Thousand Islands territorial waters. The amount approved was \$10,600 USD.

The second Grant approved was to an organization, from Waitron, Ont. (GB-12), known as the Brakewinders, a group of dedicated volunteers whose mission is to, "...introduce boat building, care and maintenance, boat handling, water safety, and sailing to young deserving adults while promoting a fun environment." By building their own prams, and optimist, they not only teach the craftsmanship of boat building, they further advance the culture and art of sailing, while instilling appreciation for our precious natural resources. To help financially perpetuate their own cause, they recycle old sails into tote bags, which are sold, and the profits are then reinvested into the program. Part of the approved grant dollars will be used to train and certify first aid and advanced sailing instructors. While a fledging organization, they have

had enormous success, producing four optimist boats and have restored three dinghies in their first year of operation. The grant was for \$5000 CAD.

The Noble Odyssey Foundation of White Lake, Mich., under the presidency of Luke Clyburn, submitted our third grant request. Their training vessel, Pride of Michigan, is an 81-foot Navy dive vessel, berthed in Mount Clemens, Mich. (D-36), that provides the 'laboratory' supporting their mission for "...cadets to work directly with scientist and other professionals in conducting underwater collection of data and in geological, archaeological and natural sciences exploration." The program teaching Sea Cadets is comprehensive and ultimately prepares them for careers In the Naval service or maritime industry. This training encompasses life aboard, drills, damage control, firefighting, helming skills, navigation, communications, and includes introductions to marine archaeology and anthropology. It truly is a "floating college." The Noble Odyssey Foundation was created in 1972, and this year will celebrate their golden jubilee. The Great Lakes Foundation has partnered with the Noble Odyssey Foundation in the past and is proud to again support this "noble" cause. Their grant request was for \$5,000 USD and will be used to fund the United States Coast Guard required quinquennial dry-dock recertification survey and inspection of their motor vessel, the Pride of Michigan, with much of the exterior preparation being performed by the Sea Cadets themselves. Our CONGRATULA-TIONS to the Noble Odyssey Foundation for their fifty years of public service, and for their passion to, "explore, study and protect," our great natural resources.

The final grant application approved was from the Silver Islet Harbour Association of Thunder Bay, Ont. Silver Islet (S-128) is the only harbour between Thunder Bay and Nipigon or Rossport along the north shore

of Lake Superior where dockage is in great demand. The Silver Islet Association officially received ownership of the harbour in 2021, and it is now under development. The grand plan is monumental, but for now we are helping them with the purchase of a header dock, the first phase, to create a slip dock for transient boaters, along with shore docking for seasonal boaters, both capable of generating critical operating funds. The grant request was for \$26,500 CAD. Their mission, "...to support the creation and development of marine infrastructures, which protects our harbours and shorelines ... " closely aligns itself with our mission to insure the, "protection and preservation," of all our Great Lakes and their associated waterwavs.

On our finances, (donations to the Foundation) in the fourth quarter of 2021 were \$4393, from 90 members, and over all there were 230 donors for the calendar year. We received several checks from the AmazonSmile program, so please consider joining this generous program, and ask your family members and friends to join too. You will find the details on how to join AmazonSmile on the Foundation's page of the club's website.

In closing, may I ask you to remember to promote, and encourage needing and deserving organizations to submit a grant application to the Foundation, as we're always accepting applications, regardless of size.

The Great Lakes Foundation had a fairly successful year, but we shouldn't be tempted to become complacent, so please do keep the Foundation in mind and dear to your heart. Why not consider donating today? We'll be grateful that you did.
