I hope all of you enjoyed your summer boating season. Our club hosted events all over the Great Lakes. I hope you were able to attend one or two and strengthen your relationships with other members and maybe make some new friends.

The most exciting news is that starting this winter, the *GLCCSchool* is FREE to members. Our marketing committee recommended the board move in this direction to provide a new, significant member benefit.

As a member, you will now be able to attend several classes each winter to explore new cruising destinations, learn about best practices in anchoring, or attend the ever-popular Rum class. For more information, reach out to Port Captain Mark Gagyi.

A second big piece of news is the upcoming transition in our main member communications, specifically *Lifeline*. In 2024 we will transition from our quarterly print magazine to a monthly online newsletter.

We're doing this for several reasons. First, since we print the current *Lifeline*, we must prepare the materials a couple of months in advance of the actual distribution. This means all the materials are somewhat dated once you receive the publication.

Second, less than 20% of the membership actually gets the print version of the *Lifeline*, meaning we're working hard to create this glossy, expensive print version of our member communication for a limited subset of our membership.

The new online newsletter will have a professional look using Constant Contact software. This will allow us to have plenty of pictures, and much more timely information. The newsletter will have brief items about activities and events, each linked to longer or more detailed pages on the website. This will allow the reader to move quickly through the newsletter and then focus on those areas of most interest.

Since 80% of our members read the *Lifeline* online, we hope the transition is easy. But please share your thoughts, comments and suggestions after you start receiving the newsletter.

Finally, several of the issues during the year will explore particular cruising areas on the Great Lakes. For example, we might have an article on cruising Georgian Bay, or the secrets of exploring Isle Royale on Lake Superior. We want our publication to not only provide information on our events, but also be a source of information on cruising destinations you might want to add to your bucket list.

I know some of you may have concerns, especially those who get the print version. But in an effort to keep our members informed on a timely basis, use

Discussing Harbor Reports reminds me of a story: A number of years ago, several of us (5 boats if I remember correctly) were cruising the North Channel. We pulled into the bay formed from the U-shaped Eagle Island, Ont. (NC-25), and noted there was just one boat deep into the well-protected bay. In the bay there is a small island right in the center called Figgy Islet. Being good GLCC members, we had read the Eagle Island Harbor Report and noted that there is a CAUTION about a large rock NE of the Figgy Islet. Knowing that, we motored around the south side of the little island to avoid the risk. As we were motoring to the anchorage area, we saw the single boat in the back had pulled his anchor and headed out (not sure if he wanted a more secluded location, or it was just a coincidence).

Regardless, he chose to go around the north side of the Figgy Islet. Sure enough, he ran right into this large, submerged rock and became stuck. We could hear the clunk when he hit the rock. Our boats all anchored deep in the Inlet and a couple of us jumped in my dinghy to see if we could offer a hand. To make a long story short,

using his halyard, we pulled the boat over sideways, reducing his draft, and he was able to motor off the rock.

The moral of the story: join the GLCC, then read and follow the Harbor Reports to get important information about navigating our wonderful Great Lakes. And please, add comments as often as you can to keep this valuable resource up to date.

Pam and I pulled *Bleu Lagoon* out for the season in mid-October. Pam and I will escape part of the Ohio

winter in Cape Coral, Florida, for February and also visit several friends before and after. Pam and I wish you all a great holiday season.

I know I'll also be doing some armchair navigation over the winter as we plan our 2024 cruising from Lake Erie to the Rendezvous in Escanaba. Mich.

(M-101). The dates for the 2024 Rendezvous will be July 14–18. Escanaba is just north of Door County's beautiful cruising area (M-72.5:M-85) and within the Bays de Noc area (M-89.5:M-101) in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

Whiskey Harbor among thousands of little-known Great Lakes gems


One of the joys of exploring the shorelines of the Great Lakes is coming across generally overlooked gems. Take Whiskey Harbor for example.

Whiskey Harbor is on Lake Huron in the northeastern part of Michigan's Thumb between Port Hope and Port Austin. It remains undeveloped and difficult to access, much as it has been since, well, forever.

It got its name just as one might imagine: During the Prohibition era in the U.S., this hard-to-access, obscure harbor was a favored site for Detroit's infamous Purple Gang to bring in alcohol from Canada.

Whiskey Harbor and its surrounding 45 acres is now owned by the Michigan Nature Association. It has rustic trails from the gravel road to the harbor. Birders consider it a prime spot to view migrating birds.

Literally thousands of such spots exist across the Great Lakes. Few have the Purple Gang as part of their history, but each is worth discovering.


The format will be similar to last year: an informal dinner preceded by a cocktail hour, providing an opportunity for members and guests to mingle and chat.

GLCCSchool webinars are free to every GLCC member. These webinars are offered to the general public at \$20 each, making this a great bargain for club members.

To take advantage of these free classes, enroll in the GLCCSchool. Here's how:

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The Great Lakes Cruising Club's location for the 2024 Rendezvous is the beautiful harbor of Escanaba, Mich. (M-101). The Rendezvous will be July 14–18. Lori Sprague and Port Captain Marilyn Kinsey are the co-chairwomen of what will be a wonderful opportunity for club members to explore northern Lake Michigan.

Many people know the play, *Escanaba in Da Moonlight*, but this historic Upper Peninsula city is about much more than deer camp.

The unspoiled waterfront and quiet, cozy harbor are a treat for boaters of all types. Well known by fishermen, Escanaba is also sought out by cruisers looking to escape the crowds.

Escanaba's municipal marina offers slips, mooring balls and an anchorage in the south end of the basin. Visitors can bring a bicycle or borrow one from the marina to explore the paved paths along lakefront Ludington Park, which offers concerts, tennis courts and a playground. A short side trip takes one to the municipal beach and Aronson Island, which offers great birding and views of Little Bay de Noc.

History buffs can learn

about the iron and shipping industries at the Sand Point Lighthouse and the Delta County Historical Society next door to the marina. Ludington Street is Escanaba's downtown. The 1864 House of Ludington anchors the east end. The hotel has welcomed many famous guests over the years, including Thomas Edison, John Phillip Sousa and Johnny Cash.

House of Ludington is the venue for the GLCC Commodore's dinner. Many local shops and restaurants are further up Ludington Street. One tip: Be sure to pick up a locally made Yooper Bar at Sayklly's Confectionery.

This location is expected to be popular. Early reservations are recommended.

This rendezvous also gives the opportunity to explore Door County, the northern islands (Beaver Island and/or the Manitou Islands) or the "Ritz Tour" (Harbor Springs, Bay Harbor, Charlevoix and/or Petoskey.

Annual meeting gives members reasons to look forward to 2024

The historic St. Clair Inn in St. Clair, Mich. (D-8), hosted the 2023 Annual General Membership Meeting, where more than 70 Great Lakes Cruising Club members, spouses and significant others gathered Oct. 27–28.

The event started Friday evening in the Inn's Prohibition Bar, an updated speakeasy reminiscent of a time when the sale and consumption of alcohol in the U.S. was outlawed. Such was not the case on this night, as members toasted friends old and new. Sipping their favorite libations, members traded Great Lakes cruising stories while sampling hearty hors d'oeuvres from roving platters--including crab cakes, prime rib sliders, spring rolls and mini twice-baked potatoes.

Saturday began with board meetings for both GLCC and the Great Lakes Foundation. Board members and guests heard from Rear Commodores and committee persons. A few of their updates:

• The club will once again be a strong presence at the Toronto International Boat Show, Jan. 19–28. We have an excellent booth, and the show is a major Toronto event, attracting 65,000 to 70,000 visitors. Members should contact Rear Commodores Dave Spencer or Eric Sunstrum to volunteer. Port Captain Cynthia Sunstrum is again organizing the 2024 GLCC Members' Meetup, that will include cocktails and a sit-down dinner at The National Yacht Club in Toronto, Ont. (O-45).

- Membership trends remain consistent. With few exceptions, the numbers have not increased significantly. At the end of the year, the organization is down 64 from last year at this time.
- The 2023-24 *GLCCSchool* year began live webinar programming on Nov. 16, with Craig Murchison's *Introduction* to *Cruising the Great Lakes*. This will be the school's 13th season, with the school on target to present 43 webinars, all of which will be free for members.
- The April Launch will be in Bay City, Mich. (H-61), this year. Mark your calendar for April 19–21. Look for an update from Event Chairperson & GLCC Director Christine Moore Skrocki.
- Great Lakes Foundation grants were approved for two recipients: The Friends of Plum and Pilot Island to help restore the Plum Island Range Light and Friends of PBS Wisconsin to fund the TV production *Wisconsin Lighthouses*.

In the afternoon, 40+ members attended a unique *GLCCSchool* event in the Holden Conference Room. Commodore Doug Jackson welcomed the group and reinforced the exciting new member benefit: free *GLCCSchool* classes.

GLCCSchool coordinator & GLCC Port Captain Mark Gagyi explained how to enroll and sign up for classes, and apply the discount coupon that makes all classes free for



members. Rear Commodore Dave Spencer presented a "mini school" in front of the live audience – an abbreviated and updated *Cruising Northern Georgian Bay* lecture featuring new photographs from this past summer's cruising and hard-to-find anchorages.

This year's Founders Award winners Brian Monrad and Cathie MacDonald presented *All-electric Sailboat Cruises Ontario Waterway*. Brian covered "range anxiety" and route planning as he documented their "no fossil fuel" 240 NM journey aboard their electric motor powered sailboat, *Cattitude*.

Then it was 60 Minutes-style interviews by Port Captain Kelly Hillman where the audience heard short adventure stories from Commodore Doug Jackson, Director Mark Lifter, Treasurer Niels and Vicky Jensen, Director (Ret.) Bill Rohde and his wife Judy, and marine historian and author Ric Mixter.

Later that evening, the 2023 GLCC & GLF Annual General Membership Meetings were held prior to the dinner meeting and were well attended. A brief overview of the current status of the GLCC & the GLF was given by the Flag Officers followed by the elections of the GLCC officers for 2024.

The meetings were adjourned and the dinner-time emcee, Rear Commodore Rob Hillman welcomed all attendees. The Rev. (and GLCC Port Captain) Sue Camaiore gave the invocation. Toasts to the King and the U.S. president were given by Past Commodore Jim "Bullfrog" Richlak and Rear Commodore Dave Spencer.

The evening program began with introductions by Rob Hillman. Doug Jackson presented several awards:

• William J. Kivell Memorial Award (for outstanding Port Captain), to Port Captain Dee McClure.

- Founders Award (for best Great Lakes cruising log), to Cathie MacDonald and Brian Monrad.
- Three Admiral Bayfield Awards (for members cruising at least 5,000 nautical miles in the Great Lakes, including significant distance into each of the five Great Lakes), to Port Captains Victor and Susan Camaiore, John and Linda Forbes, and Mike and Deb Hervey.
- Three Awards of Appreciation were given to the outgoing Directors, Ken Kabb, Mark Lifter and Andrew Wright for their many years of dedicated service to the Great Lakes Cruising Club.
- The prestigious Award of Merit was given to Mark Lifter for his long time of service to the GLCC, as a Port Captain, Director, Rear Commodore, and especially leading last year's eMarketing Committee. A well-deserved award.

Guest speaker Ric Mixter -- the most requested maritime historian in the Midwest -- gave members a new appreciation for our unique inland-sea history, through his spellbinding *The Edmund Fitzgerald Investigations*. His talk included video from Captain Cooper of the *Arthur M. Anderson*, who was behind the *Fitzgerald* in that fatal 1975 storm. It also included video and VHF radio traffic between Cooper and the U.S. Coast Guard. The audience was captivated as Ric showed video he'd taken of the *Fitzgerald* in the depths of Lake Superior and described the most likely cause of the tragedy.

Thanks go to Rear Commodore Rob Hillman and Presque Isle Port Captain Kelly Hillman for organizing the event. Thanks also go to Office Manager Yvonne Murray, Lynn Blanchard, and Graphic Designer Cindy Badley for their logistical support before, during and after the weekend's events.



Eagle Island, Ont. (NC-25) was the site of an informal gathering of Great Lakes Cruising Club members July 27 and 28. At least 24 GLCC boats converged on this popular North Channel anchorage for a couple of days of socializing.

Although Eagle Island is a large anchorage, Fleet Captain Cheryl Cheger-Timm's *Meretricious* took an extensive tour weaving through the fleet looking for a good place to anchor. Cheryl later clarified that she wasn't searching for a place to anchor but was "inspecting the fleet" and who's to doubt her?

Activities kicked off Thursday afternoon with shared appetizers. The uneven terrain didn't deter anyone from enjoying the food and chatting with old friends and new acquaintances. The next morning, many gathered ashore for coffee on the rocks while listening to Honorary GLCC Member Roy Eaton's Little Current Cruisers' Net broadcast on VHF.


Some boats departed on Friday to avoid the northeast wind that was forecast to come up overnight. Northeast is the one angle where Eagle Island offers minimal protection. But most stayed and enjoyed a day of socializing by dinghy topped off with a shoreside potluck dinner.

Thanks go to Rod Munro and Alison Brown of *Brava 1* and Melissa Spillenkothen of *Sonador* for conceiving and organizing this gathering.

There was no registration and no fee. Although it was only lightly promoted, attendance was strong. The consensus was in favor of similar informal events in the future, likely in addition to the traditional Wilderness Rally expected to return to the North Channel for 2024.







The GLCC Lake Superior Rally was Aug. 4–6 at Houghton-Hancock (S-200) on Michigan's huge Keweenaw Peninsula.

This was the first time Houghton-Hancock hosted a Lake Superior Rally, thanks to some major structural improvements to the Houghton City Dock. The harbor project included new 30- and 50-amp electrical service, water, and WiFi along some sections of the wharf.

It was a highly convenient and lively location, with nearby free entertainment and easy access to many downtown shops and restaurants.

Most of the members' boats came across the lake from the Apostle Islands a day or two before to avoid adverse weather. Others trailered their boat or traveled by car.

Unfortunately, the City of Houghton has yet to declare this part of the Keweenaw Waterway as a slow/ no-wake zone. The wake action along some parts of the wharf was more bothersome than expected, sometimes becoming excessive during the day.

If a slow/no-wake zone was established along the main part of the wharf, Houghton-Hancock might be a more attractive site for a GLCC Rendezvous.

Registration for the rally began Friday. Attendees went as a group to the Ambassador restaurant, a block from the City Dock, and known for its first-rate pizza. It also is noted for its German-style, hand-painted murals.

Saturday's program began with a plated breakfast at the charming Copper Range Depot, which is extensively decorated with railroad memorabilia. After the meal, members explored the many attractions in Houghton-Hancock and the Keweenaw Peninsula.

Among the sites: the Quincy Mine, Eagle Harbor, Copper Harbor, and Brockway Mountain Drive.

Port Captains met that afternoon at the waterfront's





gazebo. Duluth, Minn. (S-187), was a chosen as a strong contender for the 2024 GLCC Lake Superior Mid-Winter Dinner and Lake Superior Rally.

Members also were informed about Keweenaw harbors, specifically about the recently completed renovation of the Eagle Harbor, Mich. (S-204), dock facilities, long in serious need of improvement. The photos and detailed information about this major project have been forwarded to the Harbor Reports' editors.

At the social hour at the Copper Range Depot, Director Jim Egensperger played guitar and sung several songs from the GLCC Songbook, which is available for download on the club's website.

Mary Marchaterre and Dave Nitz were recognized for providing visiting boats with a jar of Upper Peninsula's unique thimbleberry jam.

After the evening's whitefish dinner, John Vucetich read from his insightful book, *Restoring the Balance:*What Wolves tell us about our Relationship with Nature.

He has spent some 25 years studying the wolves and their prey in the boreal forest of Isle Royale. He is the long-running research project's lead investigator. His book is available on Amazon.

The evening program wrapped up the drawing of GLCC coffee mugs as door prizes.

On Sunday, rally attendees ate breakfast at the Copper Range Depot, using GLCC coupons towards the cost of their meals.

After, some went west to the yachting center of the Apostle Islands, Wis. (S-191), some went east to historic Copper Harbor, Mich. (S-207), and some went north to the wilderness of Isle Royale National Park, Mich. (S-150), again proving Houghton-Hancock position as a convenient crossroad of Lake Superior.



Rochester, New York, USA (0-6) Rochester in upstate New York has much to offer its visitors

Rochester is the largest city on the south Lake Ontario shore and offers many fun and interesting reasons to weigh anchor and visit when cruising the region.

Where do I dock?

You'll most likely dock at the Rochester Yacht Club or one of the numerous facilities near the mouth of the Genesee River. The Rochester Yacht Club is a welcoming club with a recently renovated pool and deck. The basin is in the midst of a makeover, replacing fixed docks with floating ones. There's always a good atmosphere at the bar, and the restaurant offers a great view of boat traffic coming in and out of Lake Ontario via the Genesee River.

Stretch your legs:

Within a few miles' walk or bike ride on the east side of the Genesee River is the Durand Eastman Park with great hiking trails, ponds, and wildlife, as well as a nice public golf course. Schooners at Shumway Marina is always a fun outdoor burger bar on the river, often with live music.

Head to the west side of town:

On the west side of the river is Chili Beach. It's a throwback to the 1950s when it was a popular tourist destination with hot dog and custard stands. More recently, the Port of Rochester, built for the fast ferry to Toronto, has become a fun spot with numerous restaurants, live music, and bars. There are also good restaurants along Lake Avenue. One of my favorites for a casual meal in an historical setting is Hose 22, a nice restaurant in a restored 1916 fire station.

A city on the rebound:

Unlike most Great Lakes cities, Rochester is technically not on the Great Lakes. It's about 8 miles inland. Although Rochester has struggled following the decline of Eastman Kodak and Xerox, the city's premier employers in their heyday, the economy has survived thanks to many smaller businesses leveraging the intellectual capital those companies left behind.

Neighborhoods include history and art:

The stretch of East Avenue between Alexander Street and Culver Avenue is a wonderful walk for those who enjoy historic mansions, not least of which is the George Eastman House. The George Eastman House is now

a fascinating museum, especially if you like photography, but also just to learn about one of the most iconic companies in American history and its founder. One block north of East Avenue is the Memorial Art Gallery, noteworthy for its Italian Renaissance-style architecture, and its permanent and rotating collections. The neighborhood south of East Avenue down to Park Avenue has beautiful homes, and Park Avenue has many excellent ethnic restaurants and interesting boutiques.

Home of Susan B. Anthony:

History buffs will enjoy the Susan B. Anthony House, a museum celebrating the many achievements of this famous Rochester woman who was pivotal in the women's suffrage movement and influential in other areas of equality, including the abolition of slavery.

Take in a public market:

If you are in Rochester on a Saturday morning, don't miss the Rochester Public Market. This indoor / outdoor market is a fun place to people-watch. Much of the Rochester community gathers there on Saturday and the atmosphere is lively. More than 300 vendors offer produce, meats, seafoods, and ethnic delicacies. An array of independent local cafés, food stands, coffee shops, specialty food purveyors, breweries and retail shops dot the Market District.

A few dining recommendations:

Some of my favorite restaurants include Cure (French), Fiorella (Italian) and Velvet Belly (seafood). You might catch a Rochester Red Wings game at Frontier Field. Until recently, the Red Wings was a farm team for the Minnesota Twins, perhaps another way in which the Great Lakes are connected.

Visit the Erie Canal and more:

To the south of the city is the Erie Canal. The mule path along the canal is now a popular trail for walking, jogging, biking, and rollerblading. In particular, the historical port town of Pittsford is a great hangout. Schoen Place along the canal boasts numerous restaurants, microbreweries and street musicians. Fairport, Ohio (E-7) is another Erie Canal port town worth a visit. Side trips within a few hours' drive of Rochester include: The idyllic Finger Lakes and their award-winning vineyards; Ithaca, home to Cornell University and Ithaca College; Corning, home of the Corning Glass Museum; and Watkins Glen State Park.
