
The 2023 Rendezvous will be on Lake Erie this summer – to be held at Oasis Marina at North Coast Harbor (formerly Rock 'n Dock), Cleveland, Ohio (E-10). The marina is located downtown and adjacent to the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. Restaurants, amenities, major league sports, and more are a short walk or Uber ride from the marina. Rear Commodore (Ret.) Dave and Bobbe Miller, our co-chairpeople, promise a fantastic time. This marina is a bit small – only 53 slips – so once registration is available, don't hesitate to sign-up and get your dock reserved.

Lake Erie will offer three additional fun events this season:

- Lake Erie Picnic This is a casual and fun little event to be held at Herl's Harbor, Port Clinton, Ohio (E-16.8), June 3. You can drive, or there is dockage available as well. This is a great kick-off to the boating season. Enjoy Jim Ehrman's famous wings, as well as burgers and hot dogs. Bring a side dish.
- Lake Erie Rally This event is on Middle Bass Island (E-18.5) on Father's Day weekend, June 16–18, Its theme will be an African Jungle Cruise. This fun-filled weekend will include delectable food, unique African games, team activities, one-of-a-kind decorations, and more.

 Lake Erie "Semi-Wilderness" Rally– This is tied into the Rendezvous dates, and will be at Presque Isle State Park at Erie, Pa. (E-4). The dates are July 11–13. The Presque Isle State Park has a protected harbor for anchoring. The agenda will include a potluck dinner ashore, a Happy Hour meet-and-greet, and a dinghy poker run. Once you're done with the Wilderness Rally, it's just a quick hop over to Cleveland to attend the Rendezvous two days later.

Lake Ontario, Lake Huron, Lake Michigan, and Lake Superior are also all planning on rallies this summer. Check out the GLCC Event Calendar to stay up to speed on all events close to you.

As you cruise this summer and visit Harbors around the lakes, please take a moment to add comments to our Harbor Reports. You can note any changes to the reports, comment on services and amenities, or just make a comment about a fun restaurant you visited. Also this spring, watch for Steve Wyckoff's Amazing


North Channel Geology and his whimsical *Rum: History, Interesting Facts and Trivia*. And, don't forget, Steve's rum webinar is free.

Come early if you can! Thursday June 15, 1800 will be the unofficial start to the weekend - pizza, salad, cookies, water, pop and African trivia will test your palate and your mind. Cash bar is available. The cost for the meal is \$15 USD a person.

PRESQUE ISLE, MICH. (H-70) Visit this must-stop site in northern Lake Huron

EDITOR'S NOTE: These reports are accurate as of the time they were written. Things change season to season. Please check ahead with local sites if you're planning a visit.

Presque Isle (pronounced "presk-EEL") is a friendly port and if you're heading north, it's one of the last stops for fuel and pump-out before the Straits. Meldrum Bay, Ontario is a day's sail north from Presque Isle and a favorite jumping off point for the North Channel. If you time it right, as we did last year, you can anchor in the south end of the harbor and watch a few of the 250-plus sailboats, with spinnakers flying, racing north in the annual Bayview Port Huron-to-Mackinac Island Sailboat Race.

• A safe harbor: The shore at the south end of the harbor is owned by the Presque Isle Harbor Association. If you're anchored near PIHA's Crystal Point, you are considered a guest of the association. There's a dinghy dock and a place for an evening fire on the shore, plus two beaches that are available to you.

• Where to shake off those sea legs: The Presque Isle Harbor Association maintains about 15 miles of hiking trails. The No. 10 trail, the 1.9-mile Chrystal Point Loop, takes you through both soft and hardwood forests and provides many views of two lakes. This association's common land has never been developed or logged and you might see otters, cougars, sandhill cranes, bear and many deer. Two years ago, I saw what looked like a huge coyote walking near the water pumping buildings. Possibly it was a "coywolf," a cross between coyotes, gray wolves and eastern wolves. It may sound like urban legend, but this unique species lives in this area. The last confirmed wolf sighting in Presque Isle County was in 2004.

• Check out the lights: After your trail hike (and there are many from which to choose), there are two lighthouses to tour. You can ring the giant bell at the old lighthouse or crank a 19th century ship's fog horn in the museum. A one-mile walk to the new lighthouse affords a panoramic view from the tallest accessible lighthouse tower on the Great Lakes. These lighthouses have been restored to the 1910-1920 era and give a realistic look at the role that lighthouses have played in protecting Great Lakes sailors over the years.

• **Grabbing something quick:** The Portage Restaurant in the state marine is closed, but the Portage Store and Deli across the street has expanded its offerings to include BBQ ribs, sandwiches and pizza. Their beer and wine selection has been significantly upgraded to include Michigan beers and wine plus recognized and unique labels. Their freezer includes a variety of protein for your grill, ranging from hot dogs and brats to Japanese Wagyu beef steaks. And this shop continues to serve great ice cream from the walk-up window. The owners are building a bar next door that should be open in 2023.

• It's dinner time: Want some tasty parmesan encrusted walleye or a medium rare prime rib? There's Woody's on Grand Lake (14313 E. Hwy. 638) about 4 miles from the marina. Woody's Sand Bay Trading Company store has a good variety of deli and packaged food, liquor, wines, craft beers and sundries. Woody's Grand Lake restaurant has a dinner and craft cocktail menu.

The 2023 Rendezvous will be July 16–20 at the North Coast Harbor, formerly known as Rock 'n Dock, in downtown Cleveland. Some logistical details about the Rendezvous:

Dockage for the 2023 Rendezvous is at Oasis Marina, North Coast Harbor, Cleveland, Ohio. Rate is \$2.50/ft per day.

To secure dockage for the rendezvous you must call Tom Tucker at 440-309-5885 or e-mail ttucker4399@bex.net.

Be prepared with your name, your cell phone number, your email address, as well as boat length, boat beam, draft, 30A or 50A.

This is the way to secure dockage. Note: You can schedule coming in on the 15th and leave on the 21st if you desire.

There is no fuel available at the marina.

The Rendezvous hotel is the DoubleTree by Hilton, 1111 Lakeside Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, 44114. When making a reservation, use booking code "ARD." You may book online at www.hilton.com/en/hotels/clelsdt-doubletree-cleveland-downtown-lakeside/. Click on group rates. Or call the DoubleTree at 216-241-5100 and reserve that way.

The cutoff date for reservations is June 18. Room rate is \$149 per day plus tax.

Geneva on the Lake is the halfway point to Cleveland. See the town and step into the past or enjoy the wineries. GLCC Port Captain and marina manager Anne Wech will make you feel welcome.

Craig's answer:

1. Be sure to check the Harbor Reports carefully to see whether your observations have already been noted. 2. If not, please post a comment or make a direct correction/addition to the particular Harbor Report on the GLCC website. There is a "post comment" box at the end of every Harbor Report. As has always been the club's practice, the Harbor Report Committee will review your submission. We suggest you type in your material to avoid any potential formatting issues; if you "paste" long passages of text, please try to use "text only" format. Please note that this system is our preferred method for submissions to the reports, because it significantly shortens the time between when your observation is submitted and when the update is viewable by all members. In most cases, your comments will be viewable immediately. You may also utilize the Check List for Harbor Report Updates on the website. 3. Concise, objective information on the characteristics of harbors is what's needed for our harbor reports. Subjective commentary on cruising experiences is welcome but should be posted on the web page discussion boards or directed to the editor of the Lifeline (Lifeline's Harbor Insider feature).

4. It's crucial that you note in your report whether soundings are referenced to chart data. The weekly mean water level, for adjusting soundings, can be ascertained for Canadian waters by listening to the Coast Guard's weather broadcasts on VHF channels 21B or 83B (Wx Channels 8 or 9), depending on cruising area. The same data is available on the Weekly Water Level Bulletin at: http://www.meds-sdmm.dfo-mpo. gc.ca/ALPHAPRO/TWL/e_pt_wlb.htm For American waters, daily historical data are available on the Internet at http://www.lre.usace.army.mil/Missions/GreatLakesInformation/GreatLakesWaterLevels/ CurrentConditions.aspx .

5. Your digital photos and sketches can also be attached directly to the individual report. They should be in the jpg format. We suggest the file size of the individual image be kept under 200 kb. If possible, set the resolution to 72 DPI. It may be easiest to post the photos in the members' Photo Gallery on the web page (include some text description of each photo) and then email the Log Book Committee that the photos are posted there.

E-mail or mail

1. Of course, you are welcome to send Harbor Report updates to the GLCC office by email or on paper, flash drive or CD-rom. We always value all your submissions, regardless of the format they are received in. Paper updates will be generally reviewed during the offseason, and their information uploaded to the web site before the new boating season.

2. Note that lengthy text changes are best forwarded on a flash drive or CD/DVD (in any contemporary word processing format). To publish your corrections, we need to know exactly what's changed. Word-byword comparison of a rewrite against the current edition is needlessly time-consuming for the editors. Relate any new text written separately to the old report using key numbers or letters.

3. Send information on each harbor on a separate sheet or word processing file, so it can be filed with that harbor report. Be sure to put the date of observation and your name on each one.

4. Photos should not be annotated directly, but on a copy of the photo or on tracing paper overlaying the photo. Digital pictures should be in the jpg format and at 72 DPI resolution, if possible.
