Growing our membership key goal for coming year

I hope everyone has been able to get out on the water this summer, do some cruising on our beautiful Great Lakes and enjoy a GLCC event or two. The club offered the Rendezvous in Cleveland and many rallies all over the Great Lakes. Many of these events were well attended and enjoyed by our membership. See elsewhere in this issue for details.

Pam and I did not take a long cruise this year since the Rendezvous was in our backyard (Cleveland). The Rendezvous had a unique urban feel this year, being in downtown Cleveland and adjacent to the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. The fine dining options, museums, waterfront, club activities and the Commodore's dinner aboard the *Goodtime III* made this year's Rendezvous a great success.

After the Rendezvous, Pam and I took *Bleu Lagoon* for a little cruise. We hit the ports of Geneva-on-the-Lake (Ohio) State Park, then across Lake Erie to the North Shore to visit the Ontario communities of Port Stanley, (a delightful small town with many boutique shops), Erieau, and finally Leamington (one of the most beautiful marinas on the Great Lakes).

Marketing efforts

Your club's membership has been at about the same level of 1,300 family memberships for more than 10 years. We lose some members each year as they move out of the area or get out of boating. We have been able to generally add enough new members to keep our membership at about the same level for a long time.

But there has been just a bit of a dip in these numbers in the past year. As your Commodore, I wanted to start an initiative to attempt to increase our membership to secure our future and bring the benefits the club has to offer to more boaters. I mentioned this concept and work in my article in the summer edition of *Lifeline*.

A concern for me is that boat shows, our primary method of attracting new members each year, are becoming less effective. The shows on the Great Lakes are tending to show more center console boats, pontoon boats and other smaller boats rather than cruising boats.

A GLCC Marketing Committee was formed. After several months of effort, an extensive presentation was made at the April 2023 board meeting. Some key takeaways from this meeting:

We need to develop new and different marketing techniques to help us

prospect and earn new members. These would supplement our continued support of local boat shows. A digital marketing committee is working on determining our typical member profile, determining the best techniques for finding those individuals, and converting them into new members. Several techniques are being considered:

- Optimize our webpage so it is "discoverable" by internet search engines, i.e. those individuals searching about cruising locations, cruising boats, etc. This technique is known in the industry as SEO work.
- Consider online advertising on YouTube, Facebook, and other online vehicles.
- Improve our Facebook presence and activity and evaluate the possible use of other social media sites.
- Develop evaluation methods to determine which of these techniques we'll use to help us identify and earn new memberships. We expect this process will be worked on in the next year.
- Evaluate our member communications.
- The Marketing Committee team has rewritten all standard communications to members with a goal to make them more succinct, shorter, and more oriented to bulleted items to help make our communications more effective and easier for members to jump to what interests them the most.
- We will be adding a monthly online newsletter. Our goal is to develop and provide a professional-looking email newsletter that will provide more timely information than can be done with our current *Lifeline* magazine. As I write this, we are just starting the design of this critical new member communication tool.
- We will be evaluating the Lifeline magazine to determine how effective it is as a member communications tool. Due to its printing lead time, articles for the Lifeline are typically written at least 2 months

before publication. And most members do not pay the additional fee to get the printed copy. Therefore, we are considering reducing the number of issues of the *Lifeline* magazine since the new newsletter can do a better job keeping our members up to date and current.

- We are also evaluating if we should start a print advertising program in publications distributed primarily to the Great Lakes boating community. We are considering *Lakeland Boating*, *Canadian Yachting*, and *Scuttlebutt*, among others.
- GLCCSchool At the April board meeting, there was great acceptance to making the GLCCSchool free to our members. (Non-members can still take our classes but will pay something). Although there is a cost to provide the classes free, nearly everyone was looking forward to this new member benefit. Some small increase in dues will likely be needed to cover this cost. And frankly, non-members who take GLCC classes are wonderful prospects for membership, and we will work harder to follow up with these attendees of our classes and promote more non-member participation.

As you can see, a lot of effort has been put into reviewing our club marketing and attempting to create a stronger membership base. I'd like to recognize the many members who have helped with this process, including: Director Mark Lifter, Tom Tucker, Treasurer Niels Jensen, Rear Commodore David Spencer, Rear Commodore Eric Sunstrum, Port Captain Amy Babinchak, Director Christine Moore Skrocki, Vice Commodore Joe McKeown, Secretary (Ret.) Phil Doolittle, Rear Commodore Rob Hillman, Port Captain Kelly Hillman, Greg Arnold, Director (Ret.) Bill Rohde, and Fred Bagley. There also have been others.

The water can have multiple meanings

A few decades ago, I spent 3 ½ days aboard the 1,000-foot freighter *Belle River* (now named the *Walter J. McCarthy Jr.*) for a series of stories I wrote as a reporter for the *Times Herald* of Port Huron, Michigan.

The trip held many wonders. The night view of total darkness from the pilot house. Walking the bottom of the ship alongside the hold, a dozen feet or more below the surface of Lake Huron. The overwhelming, almost tangible noise in the engine room. The view of the St. Marys River from the bow. The precision by which this freighter fit in a lock at the Soo, with only inches to spare. And so on.

But most memorable to me were the sailors. Their job was to journey, back and forth, on this immense motorized ship. One minute, a sailor was at the wheel. A few minutes later, that same sailor was mopping down a deck. It's an incredible setting, filled mostly with mundane tasks.

One image sticks with me. I was interviewing a middle-aged sailor in his room – essentially a double-bunked college dorm room with walls of steel. He sat on his bunk and talked about becoming a sailor just out of high school. He had a family in suburban Detroit that he said his career aboard had allowed him to provide for well.


At one point I asked him, if he could go back in time and advise the young man he was back when he started, if he would tell that young man to make his career on the lakes? The man looked down for a long moment, then told me, "No. You miss too much."

For much of the year, he was away from home. He missed birthdays, holidays, proms, household emergencies -- all sorts of the normal events that mark our lives.

I'm sure if I'd have asked that question of others, I would have gotten different responses, but that one hit home for me.

Cruising club members sail for joy. He sailed for work. There's an unspeakable gulf between the two. The only commonality is the lakes. Don't miss them.





Annual member meeting includes a close look at *Edmund Fitzgerald*

The historic St. Clair Inn, in St. Clair, Michigan, is the site for this year's Annual Membership Meeting Oct. 27–28. But a famous shipwreck is the star.

The boutique hotel on the St. Clair River is within sight of Ontario. It has recently been renovated. Its new look is built in many ways on stories of the past, when bootleggers around the area made the short trip from Canada to the US. Other stories include one referencing Jimmy Hoffa and the North Tower, and a treasure chest at the bottom of the river just off the boardwalk.

The event begins Friday evening with a reception in the Inn's 1920s-era speakeasy, with hors d'oeuvres made from Michigan-sourced organic ingredients along with a selection of global and statewide beers, wines and cocktails.

Saturday will start off with a Board of Directors meeting followed by an afternoon activity. Attendees are back in the speakeasy at 1800 for a short reception

followed by dinner.

Guest speaker Ric Mixter, a noted marine historian, will give a visual presentation of the *Edmund Fitzgerald*, the most investigated shipwreck in the Great Lakes.

Mixter has produced more than 30 programs for PBS and the Outdoor Channel, and appeared as a shipwreck expert on the History and Discovery channels. He has had more than 3 million views of his YouTube videos, countless views on museum videos in four states, cover stories in such magazines as *Michigan History*, and hundreds of downloads of his unique interview-based podcasts.

Mixter is one of only a few who have visited the *Edmund Fitzgerald* in the icy depths of Lake Superior.

The cost to attend is \$165 USD a person. There also will be a *GLCCSchool* workshop from 1-3 Saturday afternoon. The St. Clair Inn is at 500 N Riverside Ave., St. Clair, Michigan, 48079 (D-8).

2023 Lake Erie Regional Dinner set for Cleveland Yachting Club

The fall Lake Erie Regional Dinner has been a Region 53 tradition for many years. In 2023, the Sept. 16 dinner will be a fitting end to a remarkable year of events on Lake Erie: the Lake Erie Rally, the Lake Erie Wilderness Rally and most importantly, the GLCC Rendezvous.

The event will again be at the Cleveland Yachting Club in Rocky River, 200 Yacht Club Drive, Rocky River, Ohio, 44116. The agenda assembled by Rear Commodore Jim Ehrman and Port Captain Ed Mahoney includes a cocktail hour with cash bar (US dollars only), dinner and dessert.

The cost for this year's event is the same as 2022: \$59 USD per person. As always, that fee will be inclusive of all taxes, gratuity, and credit card processing fees. The cancellation cutoff date is Aug. 31 with no refunds after that.

This year's event will again be at CYC's beautiful Center Isle complex. There is an outdoor space available for roaming, the freedom to walk the docks, and football on TV. Where appropriate, the wall-mounted TVs will be tuned to the Ohio State/Western Kentucky game. This year we are planning a Lake Erie buffet featuring Lake Erie walleye, chicken and beef.

The planning committee is working with the CYC harbormaster to place a priority on dockage requests from GLCC members. The current dockage rate is \$2.75 USD per foot. Details can be found on the GLCC website (glcclub.com) in the Rocky River Harbor Report (E-11).

CYC dress code is casual; collared shirts and nice shorts are welcome. There are a number of hotels in the area, including Town Place Suites 440-892-4275, 440-871-3756, and a Red Roof Inn 440-892 7920. A search for hotels near Rocky River, Ohio, will yield others.



It turns out, long-time GLCC members, Ted and Venetia Moorhouse on *Fairytale*, observed the GLCC burgee fluttering on my starboard spreader. Venetia simply looked up our boat in the club roster and radioed our names over to Bob and Monique in *Sea Skimmer*,

their cruising partners for many years.

Bob and Monique were stopping by to invite us (me) to join their usual evening rendezvous for drinks and snacks. "Would it be ok if I brought along a little entertainment?" I offered to bring my guitar along for some strumming music in the cockpit.

In my berth that night and in many years since, I've concluded that beautiful evening of new friendship and shared comradery, at anchor no less, to be nearly the ultimate manifestation of the joy of cruising. Beyond the wind, waves, stars, harbors, sunrises, storms, glorious sailing, restaurants, bars, on and on...It's the wonderful people along the way that make it so great.

For me, that is a big part of being a GLCC member. Beyond the Harbor Reports, it's the many cruising folks I've met and consider as friends. I still have and dearly cherish that songbook Venetia gave me.

After a comfortable night at anchor, I moved to dock



at the Beaver Island Marina (M-2) and stayed there for two nights: Thursday 6/22 and Friday 6/23. My new Canadian friends departed for other places, but we all resolved to reconnect in Escanaba (M-101).

A stone's throw across the street from the marina, Dalwhinnie Bakery & Deli has fabulous breakfasts, outstanding fresh bakery and 'to-die-for' sticky buns. A grocery next door had a fabulous inventory of food stuffs. Hard to believe such a wonderful grocery existed on an island in the middle of northern Lake Michigan. The local fishing museum is also a short walk and well worth the visit. Dockmaster Dennis and Ilene became new friends. I fell in love with Beaver Island.



Fayette, Mich. (M-91), June 24, 2017

I left Beaver Island dock, Saturday, 6/24, after one last Dalwhinnie sticky bun, at the casual hour of 1045, for a short crossing north to uninhabited Garden Island (M-1.1), where I anchored at 1245, kayaked and hiked into the historic, sacred Indian burial grounds. That was a quiet, isolated and spiritual moment.

Sunday, June 25, anchor up at 0600, headed west across Lake Michigan to enter Green Bay and turned north for a stay on the new state docks at Snail Shell Harbor by the historic industrial iron smelting town of Fayette (circa 1870's).

In the summertime, it is mandatory to reserve ahead for dockage. With the extended delay of normal summer warmth, there were few cruising boaters in the area. A 50-foot trawler and my Catalina 30 were the only occupants of the 14 slips. This is another unique, enjoyable stop for any cruiser, good enough that I stayed through Monday.

Escanaba (M-101), July 27, 2017

Tuesday, 6/27, I left Fayette, motored the 2 hours across Big Bay De Noc, turned north into Little Bay De Noc, secured a dock in Gladstone (M-100) at 1230 intending an afternoon visit. Then departed at 1530 for a nighttime anchorage up in Little Bay De Noc.

On Wednesday 6/28, I weighed anchor at 0550, illuminated by the colorful spectrum of a "lovely sunrise." "0745 on dock Escanaba. Wonderful Escanaba!"



Escanaba is a lovely port town with many attributes for the traveling boater; including helpful dockhands, immaculate washrooms, gorgeous waterfront park, lighthouse, museum, and a classic Main Street with many shops and eateries. With my Wednesday morning arrival, I had two days to scout out Escanaba and then two more to explore nearby ports and decide on the best sites to show Heidi.

I cast off Escanaba dock Friday 6/30 1100 hrs. It was a bumpy motor-sail south to check out three possible ports. Rock Island (M-88.5) is a park with woodsy hiking trails to a vintage lighthouse. Jackson Harbor (M-88) is a small, quiet anchorage. Detroit Harbor (M-86), at the south end of Washington Island, is protected but noisy with speed boats and jet skis whizzing about.

We decided that Escanaba would be the port for Heidi to drive to and begin her participation in this summer's cruise. She could arrive Sunday evening 7/2. I departed Detroit Harbor early that day and headed north into variable winds and occasional rain showers. I was occupied switching from motoring, motor-sailing, reefing, sailing, then motoring again. All normal adjustments. I arrived Escanaba 1300 hrs. Heidi drove in at 1630. *Touch of Grey* now had a crew of 2!





My GLCC Canadian friends were already here with dog Sailor, plus new GLCC friends Fleet Captain Cheryl Cheger-Timm and Larry Timm on *Meritricious* from Bay City and local sailors Brian and Virginia Zinser. Being the newbies, we all decided cocktail hour and Heidi's welcome would commence at 1730 (it ran to 2030!) aboard *Touch of Grey*. It was definitely a proper cocktail party with 10 sailors and one dog aboard, 2 dogs on the dock, Jimmie Buffet on the stereo and absolutely nothing better to do! When Port Captain Marilyn Kinsey stopped by, we considered it a semi-official mini-GLCC event!

Having Heidi aboard in Escanaba for these 2 days was way better than the two days without her. We had cruising friends dockside, local friends shore-side, loaner bikes available, a lighthouse to climb, a museum to visit, restaurants to indulge, all capped off with a fantastic July 4th fireworks show. We loved Escanaba!

For Heidi's first day under way, we chose a short ride to that special place I knew – Fayette. After several hours of pleasant motoring, we docked at Snail Shell Harbor: 1150. Taking lunch aboard, we "spent all afternoon touring the historic village, enjoying ice cream at the State Park Visitor's Center and hiking Rim-trail overlooking the harbor. A most enjoyable, special port."

Baileys Harbor, Wis. (M-54), July 7, 2017

We were surprised to be headed south on a brisk northwest wind. It's a rarity for a sailboat to have a favorable wind when going someplace. We logged a "wonderful sail, beam reach, 6-6.5 knots" rapidly approaching the north tip of the Door County peninsula.

We had planned to go down the west, Green Bay, side of Door County and overnight at any available anchorage or marina.

At 1200 hrs., we began calling ahead for dockage. To our dismay, the few suitable anchorages and all marinas had no space available. Boating season had begun! Luckily, we were literally just abeam Death's Door Channel to portside and with a 90° turn to port, we altered course into Lake Michigan and headed to a bay on the eastside of Door County to be better protected at


anchor in the building mid-20's northwest wind. At 1820 hours, in Baileys Harbor, on the second attempt, the Delta set solidly.

Tomorrow we would arrive at Sturgeon Bay for the 2017 GLCC Rendezvous.

It was a simple run with pleasant conditions from Bailey's to the Sturgeon Bay Canal to our reserved dock at Quarterdeck Marina.

Sturgeon Bay, Wis. (M-72.5), July 8, 2017

At 1100 hours, we had arrived. We met Janice Ehrman. OMG, what a sweetheart. After she learned that I had traveled from Ohio, she told me to apply for the Commodore's Trophy. Imagine my surprise when

we won. The plaque noting 763 miles traveled is proudly displayed on the bulkhead in *Touch of Grey*.

We especially enjoyed spending time with our new friends Venetia and Ted Moorhouse and have since cruised together and visited them in Ottawa.

We came to realize this group of boaters known as the Great Lakes Cruising Club, with its long history of friendship, knowledge, comradery and interest in safe, fun cruising was the right club for us.





Since our first Rendezvous in 2017, we have enjoyed participating in many GLCC events: rallies, Rendezvouses, Wildernesses, picnics, dinners, boat shows, webinars, with more to come.

Homeward Bound, July 17, 2017

We spent the next three days visiting the wonderful ports of Fish Creek (M-75) and Sister Bay (M-80) in Door County, Wis. while cruising back to Escanaba (M-101). Heidi got in her car to head home and I began my down-bound cruise back to northeast Ohio. My first stop was the familiar waters of St. James Harbor (M-2). I stretched my stay on Beaver Island to a full week to include taking in the entire weekend at the upcoming



music festival. It was hugely fun.

Homeward, I spent two days in Mackinaw City (one day due to bad weather), a slight jog north through the Les Cheneaux Islands (H-81), Friday, July 28 on the excellent state docks at Detour Village (H-83) and a 50-mile side trip up the St. Marys River (NC-0.1-0.9) to Sault St. Marie, Mich. (S-230). Learning the Canadian lock allowed passage of single-handers, I took a day to go up to Whitefish Bay and spent a night anchored in Waiska Bay (S-221). With that, I could now officially claim that *Touch of Grey* had been in four of the Great Lakes on my 2017 cruise. Beginning Tuesday, Aug. 1, I headed south in earnest and now any available current would be in my favor.

Stops at Drummond Island (NC-1), Scammon Cove (H-49), Presque Isle (H-70), Harrisville (H-64.5), Port Sanilac (H-55), Metropolitan Beach (D-44), Middle Bass Island (E-18.5) and finishing back at Chagrin River (E-9) at 1815 hrs. on Friday, Aug. 11. Total summer cruise: 2 months + 2

days, 29 ports and anchorages, about 1600 nautical miles, 237 engine hours, 2 oil changes, 1 GLCC Commodores

Trophy and a wide range of fantastic memories made easier to recall through the pages of my logbook.


Everyone who attended helped in some concrete or intangible manner and provided emotional support. Thanks go to all for making the 2023 Rendezvous a rousing success.





THOUSAND ISLAND REGION, ONT. (SLR-00.1)

The 1000 Islands truly is an international treasure

The 1000 Islands has been described as a boater's paradise. Located along 50 miles of the St. Lawrence River between Kingston, Ont.(O-13) and Cape Vincent, N.Y. (O-1) in the west and Brockville, Ont. (SLR-49) and Morristown, N.Y. in the east.

It is not the easiest destination to get to from most of the Great Lakes but is well worth the effort.

Where do I dock?

Transient dockage is available at marinas on the Canadian side in Kingston, Gananoque (SLR-16), and Brockville, and on the US side in Cape Vincent, Clayton (SLR-51), and Alexandria Bay (SLR-52). These stops are the best places to get provisions as well. Dockage and mooring buoys are also available in the Thousand Islands National Park. Numerous safe anchorages can be found throughout the islands.

A quiet getaway:

The islands can be busy mid-summer but places like Brakey Bay on the northeast end of Wolfe Island (SLR-11) offer plenty of room and enough privacy.

A bit of history:

The area was of significant importance to the British and American sides during the War of 1812 and in the early 1900s it became a popular summer playground for the wealthy and famous.

Historic sight-seeing:

Top sites include 1000 Islands History Museum (Gananoque), Antique Boat Museum (Clayton), Fort Henry (Kingston), Boldt Castle (Alexandria Bay), and Singer Castle (Chippewa Bay). These sites can be visited by private boat, but touring cruises are available from Gananoque, Rockport or Alexandria Bay.

Grabbing a bite to eat:

Many great pubs and eateries are available in the marina locations mentioned previously. Gananoque favorites a short walk from the municipal marina are Muskie Jake's at the Gananoque Inn, and Riva, a nice Italian restaurant. A little more out of the way but great places to eat include: The Cove Restaurant at Treasure Island Marina (Bateau Channel, SLR-14) and Cornwall's Pub (Rockport, SLR-30). The Ivy Restaurant

at Ivy Lea Club (SLR-22) in Lansdowne offers more upscale dining with free dockage while you eat.

An evening out:

The 1000 Islands Playhouse in Gananoque offers excellent and varied programming throughout the year.

Connecting with nature:

Nature abounds in the 1000 Islands. There are hiking trails on some of the Park Islands and on the mainland. Paddling through the Islands in a kayak or canoe is a great way to pass the time. Diving into the cool, clear water of the St. Lawrence River is a welcome option on those hot summer days.




