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Once again we're looking forward to the summer cruising season ahead and more adventure on the water. Hopefully by now your boat is launched and you're floating again. Well, let's hope so!

Low water levels on the Great Lakes have been in nearly every boating discussion lately. Launching boats, marina depths, and emerging hazards in our cruising grounds is certainly a concern for us all. During our cruises this year we must all be particularly careful to ensure we get there safe and sound.

We need lots of precipitation and ice cover to replenish the lakes and restore them to levels we prefer. There was deep snow still in Duluth, and we've had a ton of rain through April, but the hot summers seem to have kept the waters in the lakes too warm to give us the ice cover we need to reduce evaporation.

The International Joint Commission (IJC) was formed as a result of the Boundary Waters Treaty between Canada and United States in 1909. It provides the principles and mechanisms to help resolve disputes and to prevent future ones, primarily those concerning water quantity and quality along the boundary between Canada and the United States. There are three commissioners from each country. In matters of water levels they control the outflow of water from Lake Superior down the St. Mary's River into Lake Huron. By treaty it is maintained at 602 feet above sea level. They also control the water flow out the St. Lawrence. Obviously the latter one is not helpful to controlling levels on the upper lakes. The IJC does not control the outflow of water down the Chicago River into the Mississippi, which was reversed in 1900 to flow out of, instead of into, Lake Michigan.

Concerning any other issues the IJC gathers public input, involves professionals in studies, and then through reports make recommendations for action to the Canadian and US governments.

Five of the six IJC members are recommending "speed bumps" in the St. Clair River near the Blue Water Bridge. This or something similar is intended as a means to hold back the water to increase the levels of Lake Huron, Lake Michigan, and Georgian Bay.

Lana Pollack, the Chair of the U.S. Section of the IJC, and the guest speaker at the 40th Annual Grosse Pointe Dinner Meeting on April 26, dissented from the recommendation of the majority. She feels the speed bumps will raise expectations more than lake levels. To the extent it succeeds, it's apt to reduce the levels of Lake St. Clair and Lake Erie. Lastly she doesn't think the report adequately addresses the impact of long term climate change of which she is a strong proponent of.

Pollack also told us that increasing the Lake Superior outflow would not solve the problem without causing problems on Lake Superior. Regarding the Chicago River outflow debate, she said that during WWII two rivers that flowed north into James Bay were reversed to flow into Lake Superior for hydroelectric power generation. She claimed that diversion introduces twice as much water as the effect of the Chicago River outflow.

Wow, what a debate! In summary, even if there were not competing interests for more control of water levels, the bottom line would surely be finding the money.

The Great Lakes Cruising Club hasn't taken a position on what - if anything -

For instance, we have members upstream and downstream from the Blue Water Bridge. So supporting an action that's not in the best interests of such a large portion of our own members seems inappropriate.

Little Current BridgeFest Announced

Little Current, ON, celebrates the centennial anniversary of the Manitoulin Swing Bridge on the weekend of July 12-14. Construction of this important North Channel link was completed by the Algoma Eastern Railway (AER) beginning in 1912, and concluding in 1913.

The AER began operating trains across the bridge to Little Current in October 1913. In 1946, the Canadian Pacific Railroad and the Ministry of Transportation came to an agreement, which modified the bridge by adding road vehicle traffic. As a result, the bridge was left in the closed position to permit crossing of rail and road vehicle traffic, and opened for marine traffic. Today, the bridge operates in the same fashion, opening 15 minutes on the hour every hour during the spring and summer months.

In 1987, the bridge was listed as an Ontario Heritage Bridge. The historic swing bridge is of extreme significance to Manitoulin Island residents, because it is the only means of transportation on and off the island during most of the year. Over the years, it has provided Manitoulin with significant historical, economical, and tourism benefits. As such, Little Current have designated 2013 as the year of the swing bridge, with the main celebrations taking place on the July 12-14 BridgeFest Weekend.

Historic materials have been produced to commemorate the Swing Bridge Centennial, including a historic book, commemorative coins, and post cards. A video compilation will be created through a YouTube contest.

Thunder Bay Radio Closing

The Canadian Coast Guard Radio Station in Thunder Bay is slated to close on March 31, 2014, after 104 years of continuous service. It presently serves boaters on Lake Superior, St. Mary's River, North Channel, Northern Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and Lake Winnipeg.

Responsibility for these waters will be handed over to the station in Sarnia, ON. The union representing radio operators in Thunder Bay says staffing is not expected to increase at the Sarnia Centre to handle the extra load.

The Thunder Bay Coast Guard Marine Communications and Traffic Centre is one of 10 centers across Canada slated to be closed in what Fisheries and Oceans Canada says is a move to adopt new technology. The migrations of Thunder Bay's services are dependent on the installation of digital radio consoles at the Sarnia Centre. The government claims these new consoles will enable the same level of service from fewer centers and with less staff. There is nothing in this technology that will filter out calls or extraneous noise.

According to Marcie Lavoie, shop steward for CAW Local 2182, who works at the station, the operators' job is to filter out things that do not require attention, while listening for the faint call that does warrant help. This is sometimes a great challenge in the noisy summertime environment.

At the present time, the Thunder Bay center is equipped with three radio consoles, while Sarnia has two. Lavoie believes that going down to two people with an increased area is a very dangerous proposition.

In the future, the Sarnia Centre will monitor marine traffic over a huge region. Besides the Great Lakes area currently served out of Thunder Bay, the Sarnia's other responsibilities will include the St. Clair River, Lake St. Clair, the Detroit River, and half of Lake Erie.
